Rev. John V. Leach Master of Ceremonies

The Arnold Alumni is again fortunate to have one of her illustrious sons to be Master of Ceremonies at the 1962 Arnold Alumni Reunion to be held on May 29 at the Arnold high school.

The emcee, Rev. John V. Leach comes to us from Dakota Wesleyan University of Mitchell, South Dakota, where he is head of the philosophy and religion department.



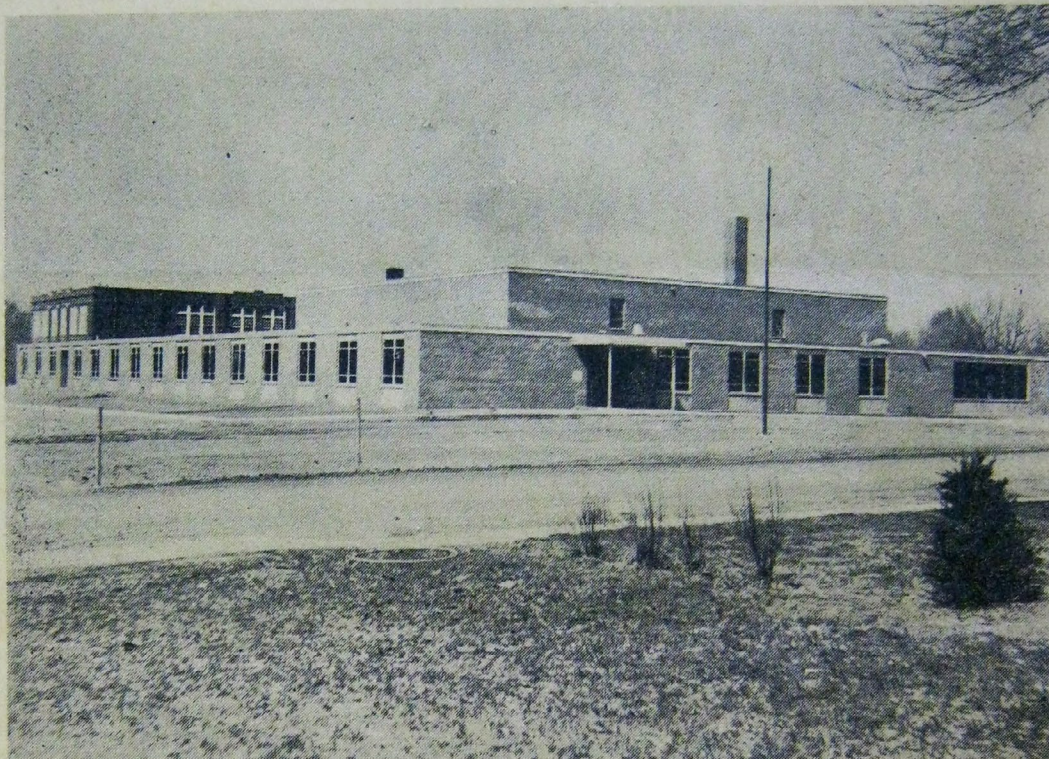
John is a product of the Custer County rural schools, having graduated from the eighth grade in 1917 at the Cross Roads School two miles west of Arnold.

After graduating from Arnold High School in 1922, he taught the Cross Roads School one year. Then after working a couple of years at the Jameson Department Store, he entered Dakota Wesleyan University from which he graduated in 1928. He did graduate work in the Liff School of Theology and earned the degree, Master of Theology and Doctor of Theology before taking up parish work in the Methodist Church in South Dakota in 1932.

At Dakota Wesleyan he met Edna Blessing to whom he was married in 1931. She was a school teacher and has since earned degrees in education — the last one being her Masters Degree in Education from Colorado State College at Greeley, Colo.

John was for twenty five years a parish minister in the Methodist Church. Then in 1952 he went to Dakota Wesleyan where he has been ever since.

New Grade School Nearing Completion



Pictured is Arnold's new grade school which is nearing completion. The building will be completed by the time school is out this spring, but school will not be held here until next fall.

The class rooms include kindergarten thru eighth grade. The superintendent and principal will have their offices in this building and there is also a combination teachers lounge-board meet-

ing room.

The new gymnasium is regulation size with a wood floor. A huge stage runs parallel with the playing floor. The nine-seat high bleachers are the fold-up type and when the bleachers are out of the way, students will eat their noon hot lunches in this area.

A modern kitchen is built off the gymnasium and students will

file through the kitchen into the gym to eat at tables on the tile floor.

Also included in the new building is a big sound-proof band room and an extra class room to be used for many purposes.

The boys and girls shower rooms are located under the stage — one on each side of the heating room.

Garland Harrell To Head Music Dept.

A Garland Harrell, who is observing his 39th years of teaching, 14 years spent in the Wichita, Kansas schools, will take office July 1, 1963 as president of the Southwestern Division of the Music Educators National Conference.

Harrell will take office for two years following the January '63 convention at St. Louis and preside at the 1965 convention.

Election to this office makes him automatically become a member of the board of the National Conference.

Harrell heads a music department of a school that has 57,000 students enrolled. Since coming to Wichita schools in 1949, the department has grown from 500 students enrolled in instrumental to the present 6,788 band and orchestra students and an additional 3,500 from grades 9 - 12 now take part in glee clubs and mixed choruses.

Mr. Harrell is a 1921 graduate of the Arnold high school.
