Alumni Reunion Held Wednesday Evening At School

The honored classes started the "early" part with class reunions held in the afternoon at various places, and of course the "late" would be the dance following the banquet.

One interesting note about the class reunion of 1918 is that of the seven surviving members: Floyd Pease of Torrington, Wyoming; Bernice Ervin Clark of Ft. Collins, Colo.; Bonnie Tubbs Arnold of Omaha; Bernice Davis Green of Elberton, Wyo.; Samuel Person of Tecumseh, Nebr.; Nellie Church of Texas and Myron Smith of Arnold. Mrs. Church was the only one not present. This was also the first time Samuel Person has been back to Arnold since 1921.

Facts About The Honored Classes

The Class of '29 had 33 graduates and of these 33, only two of them have Arnold addresses - Charles Chapin and Ruth Chittenden Aydelotte.

However, Alice Spratt Olson and Walter Fox live in the trade area and call Arnold their home.

Seven more of them have Nebraska addresses.

The interesting fact about this class is that not one of them moved east of Omaha; five of them stopped in Colorado, 10 of them got to California and the rest settled in between.

The Class of '39 decided to give Arnold credit from one coast to the other. Fourteen of the class have stayed in Nebraska - six in Arnold and seven more within a hundred mile radius of Arnold - and the rest of the class from California and Oregon on the west coast through Idaho, Wyoming, Colorado, South Dakota, Illinois, Ohio right on to John Crawford in Brooklyn, New York.

This class must have hated to part. Letha Mae Morrow McDowell is a sister-in-law of Robert McDowell; Meneda Zoerb (Pfifer) is now a cousin of Leon DeLosh's and almost relation is Winifred Shaw Johnson whose son married Joy Weinman Potter's daughter.

The Class of '49 gets the credit for having the most members who realized Nebraska - really the best place to live. Of the 29 members, 20 live in the state with 12 of them right here in good old Arnold.

They also have members living the farthest distance - Gibbon who are presently in Germany.

Five have claimed California

for their home; Bill Walker is in Ohio and Wanda Ballard lives in Illinois.

Considering that this class got "snowed in" in Lincoln on their sneak day trip and that no one had any extra money, I'm surprised that any of them even dare take a trip now.

For only being out of high school 10 years, the Class of '59 has done a good job of getting their members scattered about.

Nebraska still claims 11 of them with five living at Arnold. Three live in California, two in Kansas and Jane Pirnie Martens in Michigan; Grant Ostrom is in Wisconsin, Karen Clark is in Pennsylvania, Russ Trettel in Pennsylvania, Clark Dillon is in Montana, Jerry Story is in Iowa and Gary Davis in Kentucky.

Oh yes, watch your speedometer as you cross the Nebraska state line, as Larry Brower is now a Nebraska state patrolman and is on the lookout for lawbreakers. Trying to get even for his younger days, do you suppose?

Robert McMahon

Named Top Biology Teacher

Mr. and Mrs. Harry McMahon of Arnold have received word that their son Robert has been awarded the distinction of being California's outstanding high school biology teacher of the year.

Robert McMahon, a former radarman in the Navy, is now chair man of the science department of Katella High School in Anaheim. He is a graduate of the Arnold High School in 1947, of the Kearney State College and received his Masters Degree at Colorado State Teachers College at Greeley, Colo., and also attended Harvard for one year.

McMahon came to Anaheim High School in 1960 and in 1966, when Katella opened, he was appointed as head of the science department.

Mr. McMahon has initiated a plant and animal course for seniors fashioned after college courses, allowing students to conduct laboratory experiments which normally, would not be available to them until their second or third year of college.

Next year he plans to open oceanology units for students not planning on going to college, but wanting to go a little farther with what they have learned in high school.

As a first place choice among California's more than 10,000 biology teachers, McMahon will receive a research microscope & certificate, and a chance at being named top instructor in regional competition for California, Oregon, Washington, Alaska and Hawaii.

That there was no graduating class in 1919? Previous to this year a three year course was all that was required for a high school diploma, but this was the year they changed over to a four year course, thus — no class of 1919.

That 1961 sturdy, enduring students have graduated from Arnold High?

That in the fifty - seven years of the Arnold High's existence, we have had only nine superintendents? Honors for the longest tenure goes to C. H. Hare (1930-1944), second to our present superintendent, Alvin Story, who has been here since 1958 and next in line is Emil Benthack, who held the position from 1921 to 1930.

That our present high school building was first used in 1925.

That Arnold High is well represented in this big old world by graduates living in at least 41 of the 50 states (the nine I found having no Arnold alumni are Connecticut, Indiana, Louisiana, Maine, Rhode Island, So. Carolina, Vermont and West Virginia. However, there could be a mistake here).

To Central Africa

God answers prayer! That is not news.
But it is news that the earnest prayers of God's people for needed medical personnel on the African field in the Central African Republic are being answered.

C.A.R. Swiss worker Jean - Louis Studier visited the United States and in his presentation in Brethren churches, he pointed out the need for medical personnel. An Ohio doctor and his wife began to see that perhaps God could use them in this situation.

In May of 1968 Dr. and Mrs. William L. Walker, members of the First Brethren Church of Rittman, Ohio — pastored by Rev. Charles Turner — went to the C.A.R. (Central African Republic) and Dr. Walker helped out at the Boguila Medical Center for about a month.

When they returned to the U. S., it was with an even greater burden and the desire to offer themselves for the Lord's service in Africa. They have now been appointed to the foreign board and are proceeding with plans to go out to the field in the late summer.

Dr. Walker, born in Colorado, is the son of a retired Baptist preacher.

After graduation from the Arnold, Neb. high school in 1949, the young man, entered the Northeast Missouri State Teachers College, took his pre-med training there, and then went on to receive his medical degree (D.O.) from the Kirksville College of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery, also in Missouri.

The Walkers lived in Kirksville, Mo., for the three years following their marriage until Dr. Walker received his medical degree. His interest was served at the Orrville Community Osteopathic Hospital in Orrville, Ohio. In July of 1965 they moved to Rittman, Ohio and there Dr. Walker has carried on his general practice.

There are five children in the Walker family — four daughters: Karen, Linda, Janet and Tina Marie, and one son, David. Their ages range from 13 down to 4. All will accompany their parents to the field.

Dear Arnold Alumni:

I have been in the Army six years now, so I doubt if any of the Alumni will remember me.

I quit school in 1960, but later attained my diploma through the Arnold High School in 1964. Since that time I have attained close to a year of college thru the Army.

Since entering the Army, I have seen and traveled through Turkey, Greece, Italy, Switzerland, Austria, Germany, Japan and all of the 50 states. I can read, write and speak Italian fluently and now I would like to learn Korean. Korean is quite a difficult language to learn.
