Their Sneak Day was one glorious "trip". On Thursday morning, May 12, 1917, before any Junior was out of bed, the Seniors met at the park and "sneaked" off to Doris Lake. Some of the group stopped at Anslemo and New Helena to "see the sights". Three of the boys spent about half an hour looking over the State Park for the mineral springs.

They all had arrived at Doris Lake by noon and took possession of all the row boats in sight. After lunch some went back to the boats, and two of the boys went swimming. About 4:00 they went to Sargent and from there home to spend the rest of the day roller skating.

Their class play presented on April 1, was entitled "The Nervous Wreck".

Their Junior-Senior Banquet was May 14, 1927, Baccalaureate Services were May 22, and Commencement was May 25.

They published the "Dlonra", the school paper.

The class members were active in sports and the Senior boys defeated the Juniors, 9-7 in their baseball game.

One of the fun-things they observed was Color Day, the day the Seniors chose to decorate the school and in the case of '27 the town with their class colors. The class colors of old rose and silver ever floated proudly over the water tank.

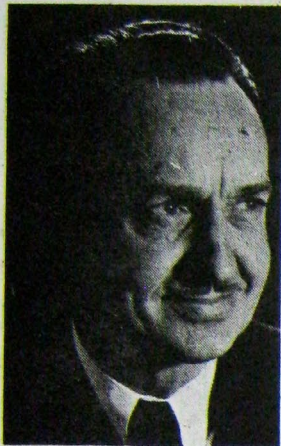

Former Arnold Teacher Dies On July 2, 1975

Editors' Note: The following item should have been included in last year's news. Since we did not have this information then, we are including this in this issue.

DR. JAMES W. BENJAMIN



Dr. James W. Benjamin

Dr. James W. Benjamin passed away July 2, 1975, enroute to a local hospital after suffering a circulatory attack while walking near his home at Grand Island, Nebraska. His ashes were interred in the Haskell family plot at the cemetery at Arnold, Nebraska.

Dr. Benjamin was born September 13, 1899, at Chester, Pennsylvania and was the son of Rev. and Mrs. Frederick Benjamin. The family moved to Grand Island when he was a youth, and he attended schools there. He graduated from the Grand Island College (His father was pastor of the Baptist Church of Arnold, Nebraska, for one year, 1923-24).

Dr. Benjamin was principal and coach in the Arnold High School from 1922 to 1925. He taught in the Grand Island High School during the late 1920's when he was a science teacher and assistant athletic coach. After leaving that post, he attended Northwestern University Medical School and received his master and doctoral degrees from Northwestern in anatomical science.

During his career he served in the Orient and in the Mid-East and was a professor at Northwestern University and at the New York Medical College. In 1954 he became professor of anatomy at the University of Nebraska College of Medicine. At his retirement in 1969, he was

assistant dean of the college.

His wife (the former Peggy Haskell), a son, James H. of Laurel, Maryland and three grandchildren survive him.

Mrs. Benjamin said her husband had a marvelous career and still enjoyed being with young people after his retirement. Wherever they traveled he found doctors who had trained under him.

"Coach" Benjamin as he was known when he was at Arnold, was admired and greatly respected by the Arnold community and student body. His life is an inspiration to all who knew him.
