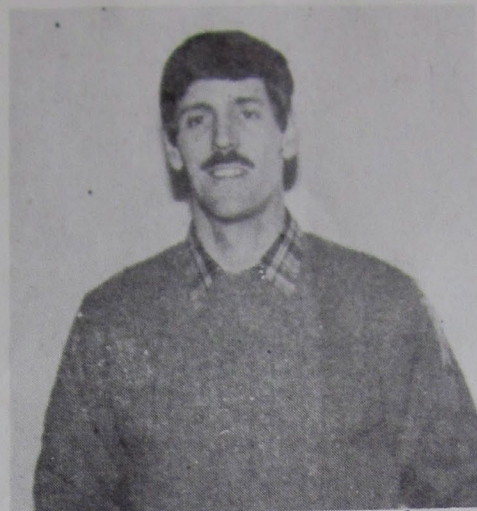
Charles received your letter and at present cannot give you any help.

1982 Arnold Alumni Banquet

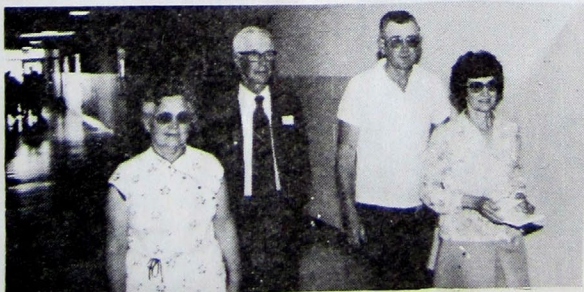

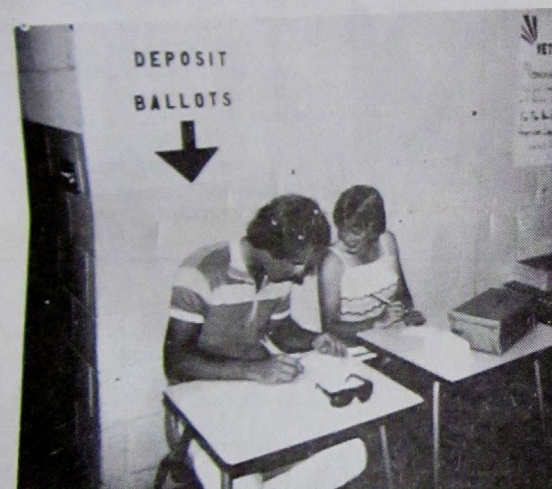
