Ray Croghan To Emcee 1989 Alumni Program

Master of ceremonies for the 1989 Alumni program will be Ray Croghan of Omaha, Nebraska.

Ray was graduated from Arnold High School in 1968. He attended Doane College in Crete, Nebraska, on an academic and athletic scholarship and received his B.A. in math in 1972.

Today Ray is president and chief operating officer of Applied Communications, Inc. (ACI) in Omaha. ACI is a leading provider of computer software for electronic funds transfer systems, with customers in 25 countries.

Ray joined ACI in 1980 as a systems analyst and held several management positions with the company before being appointed president in 1988. Prior to joining ACI, he worked as a computer programmer at First Greatwest Corporation in Lincoln and as a programmer trainee at Bankers Life Nebraska.

Ray and his wife, Deb, have two daughters. Cassidy Rae was born in 1980, and Amber Dee was born in 1982. Deb, a systems analyst, is a native of Madison, Nebraska.

Alumni Organization Formed 50 Years Ago By Class of 1939

Nineteen-eighty-nine marks the 50th anniversary of the Arnold Alumni Association, which was formed by the honored class of 1939 during their senior year. Seven members of this class, Mildred Bailey Smith, Lorine Bean Rutner, Leon DeLoosh, Bernadene Dennis Hoppas, Pearl Hutchins Andre, Letha Mae Morrow McDonald, and Bob McDowell, are residents of Arnold. We salute this class for their foresight in organizing what is 50 years later a thriving Arnold Alumni Association.

The following article was taken from the December 29, 1938 issue of The Arnold Sentinel, and details the first Alumni Association meeting and banquet.

GRADUATES OF ARNOLD HIGH SCHOOL FORMED ORGANIZATION TUESDAY

The first meeting of the Alumni organization of the Arnold high school was held Tuesday evening at the Baptist Church where a banquet was served, covers being arranged for 144 guests and a number of others were served at the cafes.

The church was attractively decorated with the Christmas motif. A pretty lighted tree centered the stage and the color scheme was further carried out on the tables. A delicious three course banquet was served by the students of the Junior class of the high school, the meal having been prepared by the Baptist Ladies Aid members.

W.E. Powell served as toastmaster and introduced the following program: vocal selection, Doris Mudd, Myra Watson, Mildred Bailey, Winifred Shaw, Margaret Steburg and Elsie Stupplebeen accompanied by Genevieve McGuire; vocal solo, Winifred Shaw, with Mildred Bailey as accompanist; toast, School Clubs, Margaret Steburg; piano solo, Genevieve McGuire; toast, Education, Willard Brummett; vocal solo, Era Mae Ervin, accompanied by Margaret Naylor; toast, Alumni, Robert Lewis.

The election of officers was held and Willard Brummett was selected as president; Mrs. Gerald Harter, vice president, and Robert Lewis, secretary and treasurer.
