There truly is nothing like an Arnold High Alumni Reunion and I am sure it is one of the most successful anywhere.

The evening began with a delicious roast pork dinner and all the trimmings, enjoyed by 478 people, which was prepared under the eye of the 2nd vice-president, Eldon Christensen, '68.

A memorial time, when we remember deceased alumni members, was presented with Cathi Rosentrater Wager, '76; Beverly Rosentrater Leach;

'64; and Merri Jo Rosentrater Halstead, '75, reading the roll call and singing, "We Have This Moment."

Alumni president Tim Rosentrater, '79, welcomed the guests and introduced the mistress of ceremonies, Tami Nansel Kleffman, '79 (who inherited her father's brains and her mother's charm). Tami did a great job of meeting the honored classes, helping Tim draw for door prizes and keeping the evening moving.

The Class of 1922 was represented by Ruth Brown Dunn of Fort Collins, Colo., who recalled that her Arnold education was great, and she was proud to be an alumni member. Mrs. Dunn is the only living member of that class, so they had 100% attendance.

Both my husband and I started out as teachers. He remained a business teacher for 24 years at George Washington High School, while I taught government and history at G.W. for 14 years, then became an assistant principal at G.W. (with a school population of 2,400), principal of Simon Sanchez High school (population 1,800 students) and then associate superintendent of secondary education for the Guam Department of Education. In the interim period, our two sons were born - Lawrence Jerome in 1972 and Daniel Richard in 1987. During this time I furthered my education by earning my second master's degree - at the University of Guam in administration and supervision - and my doctorate from the University of Oregon in supervision and administration with specialization in school law.
