Is Technology Changing Social Interaction?

Recently, the sociology class at Arnold High School presented a survey to students in grades 7-12 and faculty of the school. The topic of the survey was centered around technology (particularly cellphones, computers, audio devices, internet, etc...) and its effect on different age groups today.

The survey was, put simply, short and to the point. It consisted of ten questions centered on the topic of technology. Results showed differing opinions participants held on the effect technology has had on communication and interaction among others. Questions given in the survey included, "How many of your preferred activities involve technology?" "Do you communicate more through technology than you do face to face?" and "On average, how much time do you spend interacting with technology per day?"

With some questions, answers varied. When asked, "how much time was spent interacting with technology," about 31% answered that they spent 3-5 hours on their modernized electrical devices. While 29% stated that they spent 1-3 hours, and 25% answered that they were working with technology for *5 or more hours*. Only 13% attributed an hour or less on their devices.

Despite not having a common majority, one thing was clear: the time we are spending on our computers or cellphones has increased significantly in a short span of time.

A more surprising outcome was displayed when we asked participants how much time their school/occupation required them to use technology. Forty-seven percent acclaimed 1-3 hours were spent at their electrical desktop, and 50% believed that they gave *3 or more hours* to technology. Have electronics become such a huge part of our education and work places that we could be occupying up to five hours of our day in front of a screen?

Despite all the time we're putting into keyboards and hand-held devices, participants were adamant that when it came to engaging in a conversation through texting, calling, or e-mail, 86% specified that they much rather preferred a "face-to-face" conversation. This left only 14% communicating online or through their phone. Do you think we follow through on this statistic?

We know that 82% of entrants favored online surveys to hard copy surveys (and yes, our survey was carried out online), and 92% confessed that a "preferred activity" involved technology, but what's the real effect all these statistics are having on modern day social

groups? A more thought-provoking question we asked was, "Has technology created a gap between adults and younger generations?" 20% said they weren't sure, while only 17% answered "no," and 63% felt that "yes," it has.

We know the statistics; technology definitely has a huge cultural impact on us as a whole. It's almost inevitable to have to use a cellphone or computer at some point in our day. A bigger question might be what kind of an effect technology is having on our social skills? Is it even going so far as to change cultural traditions and customs? Is having a conversation through a text, a phone call, or an e-mail more appealing to us than actually conversing with them in person? Do we reach for our phone's before we reach to shake someone's hand, would we rather type on a keyboard before approaching someone directly?

Is our use of technology interfering with the relationship between younger and older generations? When participants were asked if they thought technology has affected communication in a positive or negative way, 51% said it's had a positive effect, 18% believed it to be a negative one, and 31%, really, just couldn't pick a side. What's your stand?

The meeting should last about 45 minutes. I would encourage you to attend and provide your views to help us with the search process. Thank you.

The Search for a Superintendent is On...

By now I am sure that many of you know that I have submitted my letter of resignation to the Callaway and Arnold Boards of Education and plan to retire at the expiration of my contract on June 30, 2015. The purpose of this article is to share with you the process that is being employed to ensure that we have a quality pool of candidates from which to select the next Superintendent.

First, it is important to note that both Boards have agreed to continue sharing the Superintendent between the school districts. This arrangement has worked well the past four years and I see no reason why it should not continue to do so. In order to facilitate the hiring of a new Superintendent, the Boards have contracted with the Nebraska Rural Community Schools Association (NRCSA) to provide consulting services in developing the recruitment and selection process. To date, the Boards have

met twice with the representatives from NRCSA (Nebraska Rural Community Schools Association) and discussed topics such as the use of committees; the timeline to be used in the selection process; the scope of advertising the position; the interview format; and compensation package guidelines.

In order to obtain input from the staff at both schools, I have been asked to assist in putting together a committee that will include representatives of Arnold and Callaway teaching staff non-teaching staff of both schools. This committee is scheduled to meet with the NRCSA Representatives on October 6 in Callaway.

Recognizing the fact that having the community participation in this process is very important, the Boards and NRCSA consultants will have a meeting on October 6 at 6:30 p.m. in the Arnold Community Center for the purpose of providing members from both com-

munities with the opportunity to offer input to the consultants.

After completing this process the position will be advertised in November with a tentative application deadline of November 21. Interviews will be scheduled after the finalists are selected. It is anticipated that a candidate will be hired prior to December 20.

As you can see from the description of the search process, the Boards of Education are committed to seeking input from the staff and communities. As a community member it is important to share your thoughts regarding the qualifications of the next superintendent. If you cannot attend the community meeting on October 6 in Arnold please make sure you share your thoughts and ideas with your respective Board of Education.

From the Principal’s Desk



Thank you to all parents who attended Parent/Teacher conferences on Sept 25/26. It is imperative that education includes conversations between teachers and parents. If you attended, you received new assessment information on your child’s level of progress as measured by the NWEA MAP test.

The NWEA MAP assessment was administered the second and third weeks of school. Staff were trained on Sept 4 how to access and interpret the data generated. Hopefully you had the opportunity to have a discussion about this data with the teacher of your child. The assessment tells us how your student is performing on a norm-referenced, national basis, as well as on criterion-referenced individual basis, and is completely unique to each learner.

Collection totes for Operation Christmas Child will be placed in the school to collect your donations beginning the week of October 20. If you would like to donate items, here are the specifics:

- Personal Hygiene items

- Small toys
- Clothing items
- School supplies

Keep in mind everything must fit into a shoebox. Do not send used or liquid items. Finally, no military-type toys can be sent (army guys, guns, etc.). The packing party will be held at the community center in November.

Please be considerate of our bus-loading zone. No vehicle should ever pull into the “horseshoe” drive while school buses are present. Park along any sidewalk, and students will then walk to parent vehicles. It is very dangerous for students when parents pull through while route vehicles are loading and unloading, as visibility is limited.

You received a copy of your students NeSA score reports in

the mail if your children were in Grades 3-8 or 11 last year. Nebraska is waiting until Oct 24 to release Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) results on the State of the Schools Report (SOSR) on the NDE website. 2014 was the assessment year set by the Federal government that required schools show 100% proficiency in Reading and Math. While Arnold did not reach that target, our preliminary data shows growth and improvement in every assessed area. More will be reported when AYP and the SOSR is finalized.

PTO has gotten off to a great start this year, with classroom captains assigned to each teacher. Thanks to Lana Cool, Heather Furne and Holly Horning for getting the teachers and parents excited about working together on fun projects!

With having such a small cast, it was difficult for Mrs. Moninger to choose the eight main characters. “It was tough. Even when I left at the end of auditions, I was still undecided. One of the factors in the four top roles involved availability for practices in the dancing scene. The scene is vital to pull the whole play together. This is the first time that we had a scene that was purely key for a performance,” said Mrs. Moninger. One of the things that will make this play different is that it is the first serious play that Mrs. Moninger has put on. With one of the target goals being to teach the elementary/ judges what really happened during this period, there will be an added scene in which a character actually gets sent back, instead of everyone making it to America. This will make the time period come to life again, showing the ancestors we are truly grateful for the sacrifices they made so many years before our time.

Shocking Facts About Ellis Island

“Three hundred and fifty babies were born in the hospital, and many were named after the doctors and nurses that helped deliver them. Ten times that many immigrants died on Ellis Island — 3,500 were buried in paupers’ graves around New York City.”
“Persons with loathsome or dangerous contagious diseases, epileptics, idiots, insane persons, those physically defective so that they are liable to become public charges, and pregnant women, were at once held for examination before a board of special inquiry.”
“Annie Moore, a teenaged Irish girl, was the very first immigrant to be processed at Ellis Island.”
“The Federal government purchased Ellis Island from New York State in 1808.”
“About three thousand people died at Ellis Island. It is a small amount, considering that 12 million people went through.”
“In 1851, only one immigrant from Russia was admitted to the United States. In 1890, 35,600 Russian immigrants arrived in the United States; and by 1907 over 259,000 Russian immigrants escaping the “Pale” came to the United States to seek refuge from persecution and economic hardship.”
“What kind of diseases did they check immigrants for on Ellis Island? Immigrants were checked for all kinds of diseases, including: Trachoma, a contagious eye disease; lice, and other physical problems such as lameness, scalp diseases, back problems, and skin diseases.
“The average travel time to go across the sea to Ellis Island was 12 days.”
“Between 1845 and 1852 about a million Irish people fled to America to escape a large famine on which two-fifths of the population was solely reliant on potatoes for food.”
“The main cause for deportation at Ellis Island was an “E” written in chalk on immigrants trying to enter the country, the “E” stood for “eye,” and often signaled that the individual had trachoma—a highly infectious disease which caused blindness.”
“Nine out of every 100 immigrants were declared mentally insane.”
“It took 6 seconds to determine if someone was sick or not. They called it the 6 second physical.”
“The Island was used as a fort in the War of 1812. When constructing the New York City subway lines, the excess dirt helped to bring Ellis Island to double its original size. Upon that Island, the federal government constructed an immigration station to receive the great influx of immigrants. Sadly, a fire destroyed that building. In 1900, when the new Ellis Island was opened, it was one of the first fireproof buildings ever (our play takes place in 1906).”
