Rule 10

Compliance Visit

On Tuesday morning, March 17, we received visitors from the Nebraska Department of Education. The purpose of their visit was to check for Rule 10 compliance. Rule 10 is the document that contains our regulations and procedures for the accreditation of schools, and can be located at http://www.education.ne.gov/LEGAL/webrulespdf/RULE10_PLEDGE_2012.pdf.

Prior to the visit, Mrs. Lewis collected several documents and forwarded them to Rick Moses of NDE. Those documents included our 6-12 schedule of classes, our elementary weekly schedules, and the minutes from our school safety team meeting.

Rick came with Dennis McGuire to go through the compliance checklist and tour our facilities. We were commended on the strength of our curriculum, teaching staff, and assessment scores. We were in compliance in all areas but one. We must make adjustments to our Junior High Physical Education program. While not an uncommon violation for schools of our size (about 1/2 are in the same situation) the state is no longer willing to look the other way in this area. So, we will need to make a change in how PE is offered and how our students prepare for and participate in athletic competitions. Several do-able changes were suggested, and parents of students will be contacted once a firm plan is in place. This will require coordinating with Callaway.

So, out of 60 indicators on the checklist, we are in very good shape on 59. Once again, the pride Arnold takes in their school has shown, and we thank you for continuing to support our students!

Youth Writing Festival

Faith Bierman and Sully Lewis represented Arnold Public School at the 2015 Youth Writing Festival in Stuart, NE. The Nebraska Writing Project organized approximately 100 students who attended the northern Nebraska festival from towns such as Kimball, North Platte, McCook, Valentine, Arnold, and several other towns.

Several of the writers were returning participants. The goal of the writing festival is to give students an opportunity to hone their writing skills in a collaborative setting and to build a community with fellow student writers.

Faith Bierman remarked on the way home that she would like to go again next year, and thinks it would be fun to take a group of friends to experience it with her.

The festival started with a choice of three morning sessions that allowed participants to explore elements of creative writing. The youth chose from these sessions based on personal interest:

- “The Most Important C’s of Story” - Writing by Melissa Pilakowski: What do Katniss and Macbeth have in common? Other than some sick bow and arrow skills, they’re deep characters. They’re heroic at some points, but at other times, certainly not people I’d like to emulate. However, stories thirst for imperfect characters such as Katniss and Macbeth to keep readers turning the pages. This session delved into some ways to get to know your characters better and conjure up more conflict for them to fend off.
- “The Name Game” by Jan

Knispel: Shakespeare asked, “What’s in a name?” Considering names and making up new names can add sparkle and novelty by using art and music to generate names for poetry and prose.

- “Picture This” by Kendra Vanderbeek: Activate your senses to create poetry or prose using sensory details to enhance imagery.
- “Double Takes - Perspectives in Writing” by Brian Mohr: As writers, we bring our own perspective to any subject based on previous experiences, person demographics, and individual attitudes. Even in fiction, the narrator’s perspective shapes the narrative.
- “Tactile Exploration” by Brenda Larabee: As one of the least explored senses in writing, touch can be extremely powerful, not only by way of description, but also a launching point for other ideas.

Each of the sessions we attended (The Most Important C’s, Picture This, and Double Takes) provided participants with an opportunity to practice the writing strategies discussed.

After lunch, participants went on a writing marathon. Small groups traveled to nearby locations pausing to write and then sharing their writing after a designated time. Some of the writing locations included: Stuart Raceway, community theater, the White Horse Ranch Museum, the rodeo arena, the chapel at the nursing home, and several other stops.

“As I walked around and looked for things to write about, I look at

things that are also in my community that I have taken for granted. Those old cars and buildings are in our town and they represent what we have in life, and what we should be thankful for,” said Faith Bierman.

As my group walked to the writing destinations, the possible settings and characters flowed and often took on a life of their own.

On Thursday, February 26th, the Arnold High School students went to Broken Bow for the Central Nebraska Job Fair. The Headline Sponsors were Adams Land & Cattle, Becton Dickinson, and Thomas Livestock Company.

The fair was held out at the One Box Convention Center, and the

businesses were set up with real job applications. The students had a unique opportunity to learn about the high number of jobs that are available in the county and the companies that are searching for the employees. Some of the students took applications in hopes they might be finding jobs and internships in the near future.

“I would have given the kids a better shot at getting the jobs than some of the adults who were coming in as we left,” said Mrs. Mohr, instructor.

The Broken Bow Chamber of Commerce, along with the Custer County Economic Development Committee and the CAPABLE organization, set up this job fair for

the area students and adults. The students were able to go through the job fair beginning at 1:30, and the adults were to begin at 3 p.m.

However, when it came time for the students to board the bus, they weren’t ready to go and wanted to stay and interact more with the businesses. “The kids weren’t checking their watches, or waiting

to leave. They were engaged and learning the entire time,” said Mr. Mohr.

After students went through the job fair, Stephanie

Miller, the human relations department of Adams Land and Cattle, spoke with the students about protection from social media in a break out session. “I will look at your resume for 15 seconds and then spend my time looking you up on social media.”

“I liked learning about all the little secrets about interviewing and resumes. The mock interviews

were great,”

Other suggestions from her speech included better email addresses, hand shakes, interviewing techniques, speed of speech, how she uses silence to get the interviewee to break the silence and start the discussion.

The organizers said that what they offered to the students (the classes about resumes and interviews) and the job fair was the same thing that was offered to the adults.

“Two of my favorite things from (the fair) was looking at how another business similar to ours (SHGP) runs. Another would be the speech about the resume,” said Haley Reed.

As an extra added bonus, the students were also invited by Palmer Monument to visit in the morning. They got to see the process of how headstones were made. They got to meet the graphic artist for the company. Ashton Weinman enjoyed learning that he free-hand sketched for the monuments as well as turning photos into the etchings. They also watched the sandblaster in action.

“I was impressed at Palmer that

First Round Sub Districts

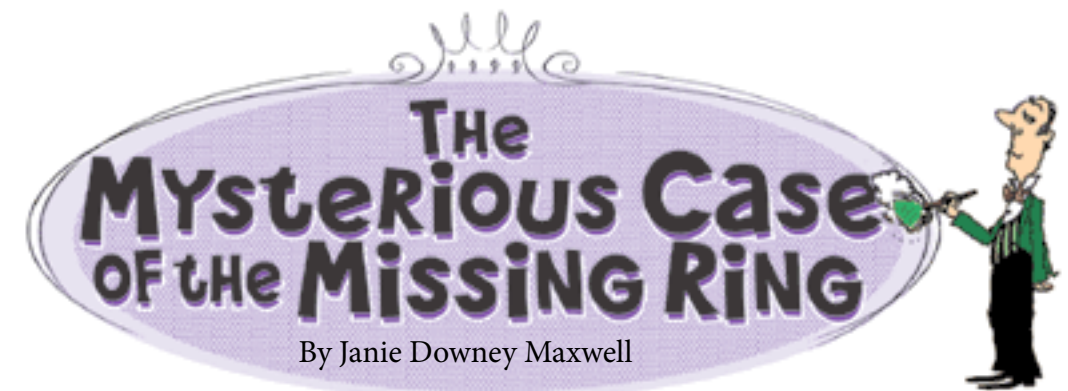

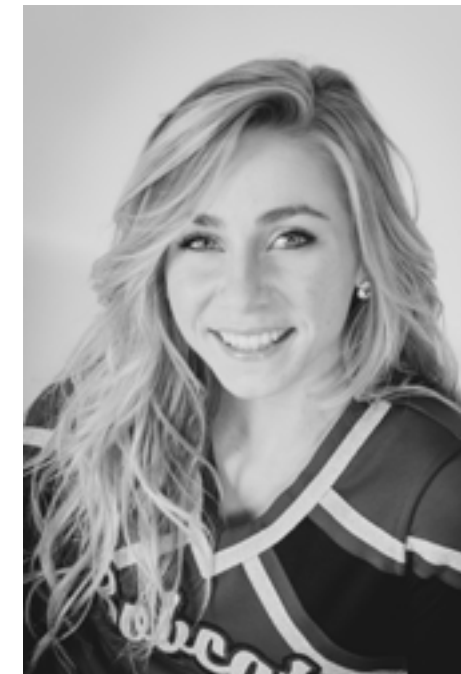

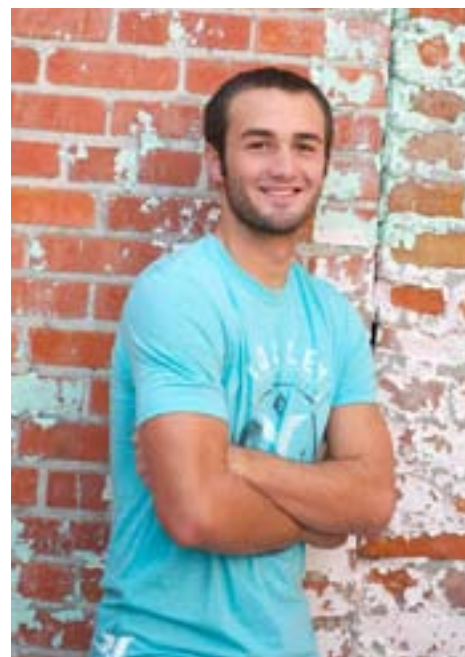
