Gerry Swingle, Arnold Public School's science teacher, is retiring this year after 36 years of dedicated service. Swingle's contribution to the school has been tremendous, and his first-rate knowledge of the world of science has inspired many students in the classroom.

Swingle hasn't just provided in the classroom, though, as he has also been a big part of the Arnold Education Association. He has not only helped with many influential projects, but has also served leadership positions in the association, including serving as president.

Swingle started his teaching career in Campbell, Nebraska, but transferred to Arnold Public Schools in the 1985-86 school year. Over the course of his years in Arnold, Swingle said that the biggest change that he has seen in the school system is the advent of the standardized testing.

Swingle loves the field of science, and his dedication to the subject is obvious.

"I really enjoy teaching science, and I can't imagine teaching anything else," commented Swingle.

Having Swingle as the science teacher has been a gift for both the staff members and students of APS, and his presence will be missed as he heads into retirement.

Berni Crow, an important teacher in our community has served 34 years of teaching and inspired for her students. Crow grew up on a farm nine miles southwest of Callaway with her parents and sister.

Crow exclaims, "We were definitely "farm girls" and loved the field work, but hated cleaning out hog pens every night after school. My favorite thing to do on the farm was to run the sweep tractor or raking hay...

the scariest thing I did was driving the combine in our wheat field that was on hillsides! Another job I didn't especially care for was application of anhydrous ammonia in the corn fields, or hauling corn to town in the fall over steep country hills."

Crow had always been in a school, and grew up knowing school was her purpose. She grew up in the Redfern Table Schoolhouse. Her family moved it and remodeled it, turning the old school to her home. She started kindergarten in West Cottonwood country school, also called as the "Hog Hollow." Her grandmother, Addie Johnson, had gone to the same district when it was a sod-house school, and her dad attended in the first frame school. Both Crow and her sister were the third generation of their family to attend the country school.

Crow only went the country school for a year. She became a first grader at Callaway, but had the same studies as her previous year. Crow graduated from Callaway from 1970, and head down to Chadron State College. After returning to finishing her studies, she moved back to Custer County in 1979, serving as a teacher in both towns.

Crow loves country school houses so much that in 2010 she bought an 1892 country school. “My husband and I subsequently built a basement lodging under it and refurbished the upstairs for a country school museum,” Crow states.

She started her teaching career with five years of title math. After five years, she became fourth graders’ teacher for twenty-nine years.

She taught volleyball for 26 years, and 18 of those years she was the head coach. She took two volleyball teams to state had had over 200 wins in her coaching career. She even led the Bobcat co-op volleyball team for three years! The talented teacher was also assistant coach for basketball for 14 years and was assistant coach for track for 13 years.

Crow is also known for her skills as a director. Crow directed 11 elementary plays and was a One Act coach one year. Mrs. Crow coached high school speech for five years, helping guide multiple students to the state!

Crow loves to take the opportunity to help her students discover the wonders of Nebraska life. She brought fun to the 8th grade classes for 13 years because she took them on a 5-day outdoor-ed trip following the Platte River System, Oregon Trail, and where they ended up at the Sugar Loaf Campground in Wyoming. There, the students had climbed and boulder up a steep mount, cooks their own meals, and sleep in tents. Mr. Mohr, Mr. Swingle, and Mr. Peterson were also involved in these trips.

Berni Crow’s student’s favorite place is when she takes them to an overnight trip to the Henry Doorly Zoo and state capitol. Crow’s favorite trip out of all was the overnight trip to Halsey 4-H camp, where student did all sorts of activities like canoeing, bird watching, and hikes!

“I can honestly say that I thoroughly loved every fourth grade class and all of the Title One math students that I taught. The innocence of children, their desire to learn, the quirky things they say, and the respect they showed me made every day a GREAT day. Sure, there were “those days”, but thank goodness, they were few and far between,” states Crow, “My best moments were simple things like watching a student get that “Aha” moment when they finally caught on to something! I love the education field experiences that my students earned money for.”

Crow admits though that the only disappointment might be that she really wanted to be a high school Science teacher. However, she was glad to feed the desire by teaching science to forth graders along with math, which is her second favorite class. Crow’s opinions came to play throughout the years.

“Perhaps one of the toughest things that I will do in my career is walk out that east door for the last time as a teacher. My students have taught me more than anyone can every imagine. They were good at asking questions I couldn’t answer, but I always researched to find that answer for them. I love reading, so I’m sure that I’ll keep on learning. To those who’ve said, “ You’ll be so bored when you retire.” I have to say, “Then you truly don’t know me.”

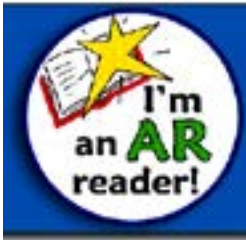

Age Requirements:

Minimum Age: Nebraska State Law LB1006 revised the age requirements for students entering kindergarten. The bill states: Children must reach the age of 5 years on or before July 31.

Any exceptions may be considered on a case by case basis. Specific guidelines and assessment results will apply.

The assessment request, a parent questionnaire, and additional documents must be completed and returned to the District no later

than May 1st of the spring before fall enrollment to allow timely assessment to be completed.

Decisions regarding early kindergarten entrance must include consideration of the above and shall not be made based on race, color, gender, religion, ancestry, national origin, marital status, age, disability, or sexual orientation of the child's parents or guardians. Institutional factors, such as capacity, may also be considered. Please bring your child's birth certificate and vacation records to have on file in the office.

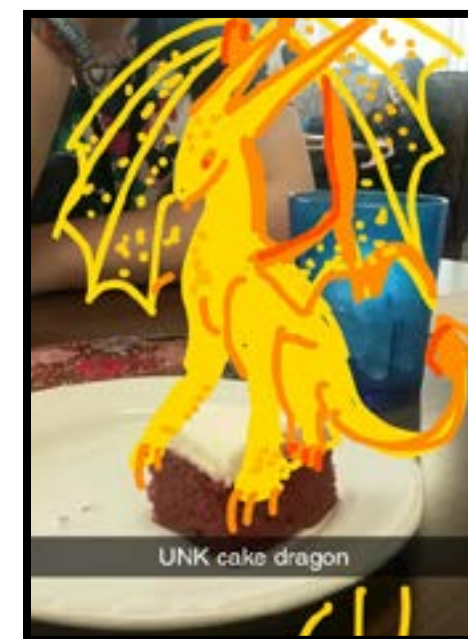

Speech Community Night

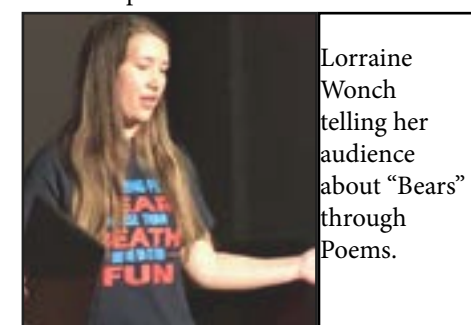

Seniors...It's decision time!

Here's how to make your final college decision.

Compare your college acceptance letters, financial aid award notifications, and campus visit notes. List the pros and cons of each school using the following criteria:

Location – Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If so, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.

Cost – Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond your freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships? How much in student and parent loans will you need to borrow to cover expenses?

Academic program – Which college offers the degree program that best fits your career interests? What happens if you change majors? Does the college offer other degree programs that interest you?

Student life – Does the school offer activities you will enjoy? If you plan to live on campus, do you like the housing arrangements provided by the school? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus?

Make your final decision by May 1 and then notify the colleges you're rejecting so they can offer your spot, and financial aid, to another student.

Juniors... these questions will help you narrow your college choices

By picking your top colleges now, you'll be better prepared to apply for financial aid and college admission early next fall. Start by answering these questions:

What do you want to study?

Explore your career interests and then research colleges that offer programs in areas you may want to pursue. Use college selection tools like College Profiles at EducationQuest.org.

What kind of school do you want to attend?

Do you prefer a large university or a small college? Are you interested in a community college? What kind of student/teacher ratio do you want?

Where do you want to go to college?

Do you want to live close to home or far away? Do you want to be in a major city or a small town? How big of a factor is out-of-state or private school tuition? If you want to go out of state, investigate programs like the Midwest Student Exchange Program which may provide discounted tuition.

What can you afford?

Consider overall costs: tuition, room and board, books, transportation, and personal expenses. (See "About Nebraska Colleges" for costs.) Determine what you and your parents can afford to pay out-of-pocket and plan to apply for financial aid to help make up the difference. Calculate the loan debt you and your parents may need to incur to pay for your college education.
