What Parents Can Do At Home to Help Students With Math

Math is around all the time. And in today's high tech society, everyone needs a strong foundation in math to be successful. Workers need quick reasoning and problem-solving skills. They need to estimate and use mathematical thinking.

Even calculators and computers, which some said would make math outdated, require students to have good math skills. In fact, because calculators are only as accurate as the people operating them, these machines make it even more important for students to have strong mental math skills so they can tell quickly if the answer is reasonable.

Sometimes, children don't see how useful math can be. Parents can help. When you or your child use math in your everyday activities, point it out. Did you child glance at the clock to see how many minutes remain before his favorite TV show? That's math. Did he figure out how many weeks' allowance it will take before he can buy a new video game? That's math too.

Whether you're looking for extra math activities to enjoy with your child or advice on how to help a struggling

student do better, the activities that follow can help. By working on these activities with your child, you can promote a healthy interest in math, an appreciation of why math is useful and a positive attitude about studying math in school.

Take a Math Walk:

When you are your child walk in your neighborhood, count the number of animals, birds, fire hydrants or green cars you see. Look for geometric shapes and terms - circles, right angles, cones, and so on - in the windows and buildings. Estimate how far you'll walk. Later, you can check with pedometer or car odometer.

Ask a Silly Question:

Try making math fun by asking your child silly questions that require math to answer them: "How many minutes are there until your birthday?" "What percentage of the pizza did Dad eat tonight?" After you ask the question, ask your child how she could find the answer. Have her solve the problem with a pencil and paper or with a calculator. Challenge each other to think of new fun questions.

We are excited to announce that the national trend towards online news and magazines has finally arrived in Arnold. For several years, we have thought about taking our newsletter online. We have even taken small steps in that direction by posting the newsletter in PDF and ePUB formats for family and friends outside the Arnold School District to read at their leisure. It has been a great pleasure to receive several emails and comments from people in various towns and other states that are reading the newsletter online already.

Beginning in October of 2016, we will publish our first completely online newsletter for the public. We will be uploading the newsletter to the school web site on the 1st of each month. An announcement notifying the public will appear on the first page of the school web site when it is ready. We will also provide a printable version of the school calendar (with all the changes made avail-

able at the time of printing) and the lunch calendar for patrons to print at home.

There will be some visual improvements that will be noticeable right away. You will see more color, and we won't be as restricted for layout and space because we won't have to worry about the number of pages. We can include more pictures for each of the events, instead of simply using one, therefore more students can be rewarded for their hard work. Some other benefits of the online version of the newsletter include the shared links to family and friends about their student. Another benefit is that we can make all links active in the newsletter so you can immediately use web sites that the newsletter discussing and wants you to visit. The school will also benefit in that they will save money on paper, ink, postage, and class time of other students to help get it folded, counted, and boxed up for the mail.

We will continue to mail the August-September newsletter at the end of July each year. There are many items in the school newsletter that are needed as the

school year begins and this is an efficient way to communicate. We will also continue to mail the April-May-Summer newsletter at the end of March, as it has so many announcements for the end of the year and

the summer interests.

If you want a printed version of the school newsletter at any other time of the year, simply stop in the office, or in Mrs. Badgley's room, and we will be happy to print off a copy.

Things to keep in mind as we make this transition:

- The school calendar is actually more up-to-date if you look at it online. The times that are changed or updated appear daily. Other additional dates and announcements also appear on the school calendar as the month progresses.
- The lunch calendar, though it doesn't really change during the course of the month, is also visible on the web site as well.

This year things will be the same as last year for laptop check out. The parents will not be required to come to the school to sign papers. The students will come to a boot camp on the first couple of days of school, with Mrs. Badgley and Mr. Jageler. The students will also go through a new lesson about online safety with their laptops and with other electronic devices. We will also review the school rules, and the consequences when someone is breaking the rules during school hours, and when they are off school grounds.

We will also go through some study skills demonstrations with their laptops, set up their foldering, printing, and passwords for the school year.



4. Registration form




Box Tops


Capri Sun Bags

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. Arnold Public Schools offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.30 (K-12), lunch costs \$2.30 (K-5), \$2.55 (6-12). Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$.40 for breakfast and \$.30 for lunch. If your child(ren) qualified for free or reduced price meals at the end of last school year, you must submit a new application by September 20th, 2016 in order to avoid an interruption in meal benefits.

This packet includes an application for free or reduced price meal benefits and a set of detailed instructions. Below are some common questions and answers to help you with the application process.

1. WHO CAN GET FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEALS?
 - All children in households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR) are eligible for free meals.
 - Foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court are eligible for free meals.
 - Children participating in their school's Head Start program are eligible for free meals.
 - Children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant are eligible for free meals.
 - Children may receive free or reduced price meals if your household's income is within the limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Your children may qualify for free or reduced price meals if your household income falls at or below the limits on this chart.
2. HOW DO I KNOW IF MY CHILDREN QUALIFY AS HOMELESS, MIGRANT, OR RUNAWAY? Do the members of your household lack a permanent address? Are you staying together in a shelter, hotel, or other temporary housing arrangement? Does your family relocate on a seasonal basis? Are any children living with you who have chosen to leave their prior family or household? If you believe children in your household meet these descriptions and haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail Arnold Public Schools.
3. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD? No. Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household. We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to: Amy Nansel, PO Box 399 Arnold Public Schools, 308-848-2226 ext. 4.
4. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE ALREADY APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? No, but please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. If any children in your household were missing from your eligibility notification, contact Amy Nansel, PO Box 399 Arnold Public Schools, 308-848-2226 ext. 4.
5. immediately.
6. CAN I APPLY ONLINE? You are encouraged to complete an online application instead of a paper application if your school district makes this option available. The online application has the same requirements and will ask you for the same information as the paper application. Visit Arnold Public Schools website to begin or to learn more about the online application process. Contact Amy Nansel, PO Box 399 Arnold Public Schools, 308-848-2226 ext. 4.
7. If you have any questions about the online application.

8. **MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT A NEW ONE?**
Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first few days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year. If you do not send in a new application that is approved by the school or you have not been notified that your child is eligible for free meals, your child will be charged the full price for meals.
9. **I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS?** Children in households participating in WIC may be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please send in an application.
10. **WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED?** Yes. We may also ask you to send written proof of the household income you report.
11. **IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER?** Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.
12. **WHAT IF I DISAGREE WITH THE SCHOOL'S DECISION ABOUT MY APPLICATION?** You should talk to school officials. You also may ask for a hearing by calling or writing to: **Joel Morgan, P.O. Box 399 Arnold Public Schools, 308-848-2226 ext. 2.**
13. **MAY I APPLY IF SOMEONE IN MY HOUSEHOLD IS NOT A U.S. CITIZEN?** Yes. You, your children, or other household members do not have to be U.S. citizens to apply for free or reduced price meals.
14. **WHAT IF MY INCOME IS NOT ALWAYS THE SAME?** List the amount that you normally receive. For example, if you normally make \$1000 each month, but you missed some work last month and only made \$900, put down that you made \$1000 per month. If you normally get overtime, include it, but do not include it if you only work overtime sometimes. If you have lost a job or had your hours or wages reduced, use your current income.
15. **WHAT IF SOME HOUSEHOLD MEMBERS HAVE NO INCOME TO REPORT?** Household members may not receive some types of income we ask you to report on the application, or may not receive income at all. Whenever this happens, please write a 0 in the field. However, if any income fields are left empty or blank, those will also be counted as zeroes. Please be careful when leaving income fields blank, as we will assume you meant to do so.
16. **WE ARE IN THE MILITARY. DO WE REPORT OUR INCOME DIFFERENTLY?** Your basic pay and cash bonuses must be reported as income. If you get any cash value allowances for off-base housing, food, or clothing, it must also be included as income. However, if your housing is part of the Military Housing Privatization Initiative, do not include your housing allowance as income. Any additional combat pay resulting from deployment is also excluded from income.
17. **WHAT IF THERE ISN'T ENOUGH SPACE ON THE APPLICATION FOR MY FAMILY?** List any additional household members on a separate piece of paper, and attach it to your application. Contact **Amy Nansel, P.O. Box 399 Arnold Public Schools, 308-848-2226 ext. 4.**
18. To receive a second application.
19. **MY FAMILY NEEDS MORE HELP. ARE THERE OTHER PROGRAMS WE MIGHT APPLY FOR?** To find out how to apply for SNAP or other assistance benefits, please go online to ACCESSNebraska.ne.gov or call 1-800-383-4278.

For households receiving benefits from the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP), Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) or the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), follow these instructions:

- Part 1: List each child's name, the school they attend and their grade.
- Part 2: Enter household's Master Case Number if the household qualifies for SNAP, TANF or FDPIR.
- Part 3: Skip this part.
