Within the Veterans Program on Friday, November 11th, a part of the ceremony included honoring Mr. Robert



"Bob" Reed and his wife Shirley. Shortly after Mr. Reed's passing in 2015, Mrs.

Berni Crow had the honor of working with Mr. Reed's daughter Susie to coordinate the family donation of a flag pole. Susie wanted to provide funding for a memorial to the school, since her parents did so much over the years and touched the lives of so many.

"Finally, after many texts, emails, and calls, with the help of Dr. Lewis, Mr. Morgan, and the Arnold School Board, it

was decided that a flag would be placed on the west side of the school," explained Mrs. Crow. The funding for the project would be provided by Susie and her brother's families, making this all possible.

Susie stated, "Dad was in the United States Navy and was in the Korean War, 1951-1955." A perfect day to honor him was of course Veteran's Day. Former principal Mike Harvey added that Bob served in the "Good-will" tour, traveling to many other countries to promote Americanism and to support the United States.

He was the Arnold

school principal from 1978-1995 when he retired.



Like many other beneficiaries at our school, he never really left the school. He continued on to be the

county superintendent, making a daily trip to Broken Bow to help celebrate students' education.

His death caused a stir of sadness across the school, as many teachers and staff remembered him for the kind, caring man that he was.

After this, Mrs. Crow gave a nice speech about Mr. Reed, his history and connections to the Arnold School system and to the community. Then the crowd progressed to the west end of the building for the first raising of the flag dedicated in Mr. Reed's name. Men and women from all ages piled out to the west end of the school and put their hand over their hearts, remembering Mr. Reed. Whether the students knew him or not, the respect that was shown was unforgettable.



Attorney General Makes A Stop!

On November 3rd, the students in grades 6-12 of Arnold High School were delighted to have a very special person come and speak to them. The person? Nebraska's own state attorney general, Doug Peterson.

After being elected in 2015, Mr. Peterson will ride out his four-year term until 2019, where he can choose to either resign from office or run again, attempting to gain the vote of our state's great people.

As soon as Mr. Peterson walked into the gym, you could feel a certain importance in the air. His words carried even more of this. One of his first topics was informing the junior high and high school students the importance of the Constitution. He explained that the country was built on the single foundation of the document and that it protects the liberties of the people and prevents others from having too much power.

After the briefing of the Constitution, there were handheld versions available to the students. He then went on to talk about his job. As attorney general, Mr. Peterson is the chief law officer of Nebraska. There are currently 65 lawyers in office that represent the state in court cases, including ones that Nebraska files against other states. In this instance, it will be taken up the Supreme Court for judgement.

One of the hot topics that have been hitting people of all ages includes the legalization of marijuana, a hot topic with our neighboring state, Colorado.

Our attorney general explained that while we may think mari-

juana isn't a bad drug, it's a lot more potent than we think. Back in the 1970s and 1980s, the amount of THC (the chemical that produces the high) was only at 5-10% in marijuana. Today, there's some with THC that is powerful as 80%!

With young people being especially susceptible to getting addicted to these drugs and some even more potent. The rise of prescription drugs



scientists found out that heavy users had a difference in soft brain matter (the part that impacts creativity). If that doesn't scare you, who knows!

Another hot topic that he covered was the ever-growing risk of human trafficking. With a horrifying story that took place out of Waverly, he really got to the students. He warned that it could happen to anyone, anywhere, anytime. The students were to

realize that things like this "don't just happen in Omaha and Lincoln."

One cause of the rise in human trafficking is the device we have in our hands and almost rely on: cell phones. With the advancement in technology and having the world at your fingertips, things such as child pornography are becoming very concerning for our Attorney General.

He warned the students that the best thing they could do to protect themselves was to limit their time on their phones and computers. Staying in a public area with them at almost all times would help decrease this rate.

"I hope it gets through to some of you that you need to make good choices," said Mr. Peterson, who has seen the affects of these issues.

When leaving, the students clapped and were very surprised with how interesting he really was.

"I thought he was just going to be really boring, but he kept my attention the entire time," says Lexi Starr, sophomore.

There were quite a few similar comments following the hour-long presentation, and the students are hoping for more speakers like him.

Our School Board Association hosts a State Education Conference every year in November in Omaha. I attend this regularly with our board members. It is a wonderful time to get to know my board members better, and spend time visiting with other superintendents and boards from other communities. Our SHGP students were showcased in a "science-fair" style session on Friday morning. They spoke like seasoned professionals to leaders from across the state, and I am infinitely proud of how they conducted themselves during this time.

The prevailing theme at the conference this year was the tax structure which generates income for the state of Nebras-

ka. Unfortunately, schools are often blamed for high taxes, but the truth of the matter is that our public schools are not "over-spending" as has been a media message during this election season. School funding is broken. There are measures being proposed to fix this, and hopefully some good solutions come out of legislation this year. Arnold's general fund budget growth over the past few years has been limited to operating expenses, predominantly teacher salaries and benefits. And sadly, APS is still well behind the state curve on base pay. It pains me to think of the tax checks that some of you write to the county; however, I am thankful for the abundance we have

been given as a community, to support our own school without equalization aid from the state. Hopefully our elected officials can find a balance that we can all live with this session!





"Santa comes from Swedish trolls" Toni said.


There are all kinds of stories an ideas as to where Santa came from.
