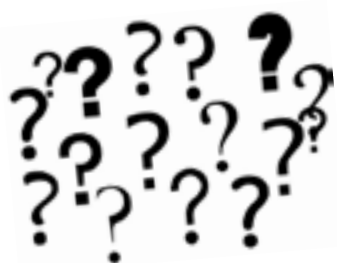
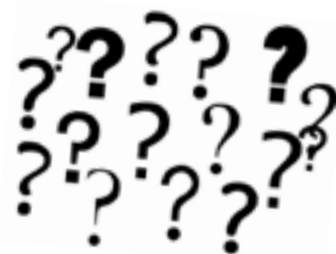

# Bobcats Show a Strong Start to Season

## Bobcats Secure the Win at Season Opener

SARGENT—On Friday, December 6, the South Loup boys basketball team traveled to Sargent to play the Twin Loup Wolves for their 2019 season opener. The Bobcat boys’ quickness on defense and well-run offense won them the game, with the final score being 60-25.

“The boys did an outstanding job on the defensive end, forcing 30 turnovers, most of which resulted in layups on the offensive end. There was good balance offensively, with points spread out among the team,” said head coach Jeff Cole.

The Bobcats were on fire in the first half, scoring 49 of their 60 points in the first two quarters; they put up 31 points in just the second quarter. Senior guard Jace Connell contributed 12 of these points, and Junior Drew Vickers added 10.

“The season opener was good. We got to knock off some rust before taking on Amherst, who we knew was going to be a good team,” said Connell.

The outstanding defensive effort made by the Bobcats held the Wolves to just 14 points in the first half. South Loup swiped the ball from the Wolves a total of 19 times. Senior post Connor Rosfeld finished with 4 steals of his own.

## Bobcats Beat the Trojans from the Line

ARNOLD—The South Loup Bobcat boys basketball team took the win over the Cambridge Trojans on Friday, December 13. The game was a hard-fought battle from the beginning; the Bobcats finished on top, with the final score being 66-59.

Senior Eddie Berger was on fire from behind the arc, making 4 of his 5 attempted 3-point shots. He was also strong from the line, putting in 10 of his 12 free throws. Berger finished as leading scorer, with 22 total points.

Senior Grant Jones was a force to be reckoned with in the paint. He finished the game with 16 points, 6 of which came from free throws. He finished with 6 rebounds, 5 assists, and a block.

The Bobcats’ win can be attributed to their success on the free throw line. While the Trojans outshot the SLB boys from both behind the 3-point line and from the inside, the Bobcats dominated the free-throw line. The Bobcats had 34 free throw attempts, shooting 64%, the Trojan’s only had 9 attempts, and shot under 50%.

“We shot the ball well; our free throws won us the game,” said Head Coach Jeff Cole.

The boys are getting better with each game. Their aggressiveness is winning them ball games.

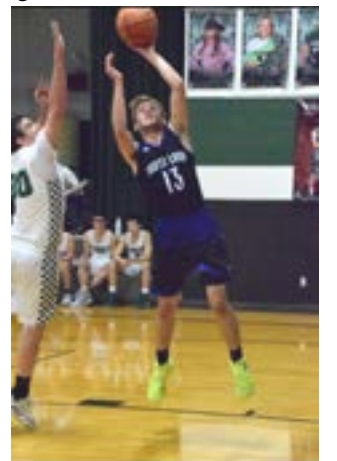

# Bobcats Face the Spartans

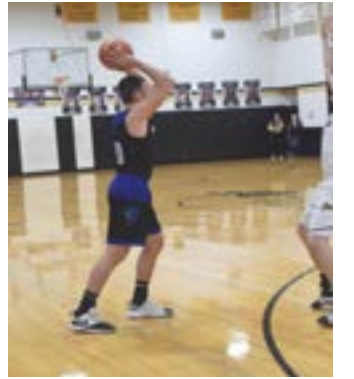

“Music can change the world because it can change people.” – Bono. After 22 years of dedicated teaching at Arnold Public Schools, Ms. Bailey is officially retiring. Through her years, Bailey has impacted the students in the music program in a plentitude of ways. Her passion for music and drive to inspire kids to find a love for music will be missed.

Bailey graduated from Hastings High School and then Hastings College with a Bachelor’s degree in Music Education. She also did graduate work in music education at UNK. After teaching music for 10 years at other schools, she worked for 12 years in the news-paper business.

She was a State Circulation Sales Represen-tative serving 11 Nebraska counties and 3 Kansas counties for the Oma-ha World Herald, recruiting carriers, distributors, running sales promo-tions, and handling transportation issues for 10 years and then for 2 years at the North Platte Telegraph doing the same work.

After this, she transitioned to Ar-nold in the fall of 1988 where she has remained for the past 22 years. In



total, Ms. Bailey has taught 32 years of music, and Arnold is grateful to have had her for so many of them.

Teaching K-12 music is no easy feat, but Ms. Bailey has done it very well. The annual winter and spring concerts are always outstand-ing. Besides these, Bailey has led kids in playing at Veteran’s Day pro-grams, Memorial Day services, and singing the national anthem at high school activities.



From these programs, Bailey has many great recollections, “I have fond memories of the elementary Christmas musicals we’ve performed over the years: San-ta’s Shopping Net-work, Survival San-ta, Holiday Magic, ‘Twas the Night Before Christmas, Twinkle and Shine, and the most recent Bring on the Snow.”

Ms. Bailey has also dedicated her time to take students to special music opportuni-ties, such as Sing Across\* Nebraska and honor band and choir events. Along with those activities, Bailey has also taken her high school band and choir to the MNAC and district music competitions annually.

Through her years of teach-ing, Ms. Bailey has seen many changes. In 1998, the band met first period daily and was comprised of

grades 7-12. The 7th grade general music met daily the first semester and 8th grade had general music second semester. Choir met daily the last period of the day. Currently, there are two periods of high school music split between band and choir.

In 1998, the elementary school was grades K-6, with all grades participating in music every day. Currently K-4 classes meet for general music 3 days per week. Playing an instrument is taught to all students in grades 5 and 6, which includes general music, singing, instrumental instruction, and, in 6th grade, they also learn to play guitar.

Ms. Bailey has enjoyed her years here at APS, “I have really enjoyed working here at Arnold. My work with music K-12 is NEV-ER routine. I love teaching mu-sic. Music touches our lives in so many ways: learning to read music and play an instrument develops our brains, connecting both sides, lighting it up with connections all over it! 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# College Planning Bulletin

Seniors...make sure you complete the FAFSA process Getting financial aid for college involves more than completing the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). Complete each step of the process so that you don't miss out on money for college.

1. If you haven't already, complete your 2020-21 FAFSA at FAFSA.gov using 2018 income tax data. Before you start, you and a parent must each get an FSA ID at fsaid.ed.gov as you'll need them to access and sign your FAFSA.
2. Expect a Student Aid Report (SAR) via an email link. The SAR acknowledges that your FAFSA was received and lets you know if you need to take further action before the form can be processed.
3. You might receive a verification notice from the college(s) you listed on your FAFSA requesting documents to verify your FAFSA information. The college will not process your financial aid until you provide required documents.
4. Watch for financial aid award notifications. Once you're accepted for admission to the colleges you listed on your FAFSA, they will notify you of the types and amounts of financial aid they're offering.

Watch your email and student portal carefully for important details about admission and financial aid.

What you need to know about scholarships

Most scholarships are based on academics, but others are based on community service, school involvement, or talent. Some are based on financial need as determined by the results of your FAFSA.

Here's where to look for scholarships:

1. ScholarshipQuest at EducationQuest.org houses over 2,000 Nebraska-based scholarships. After you create a profile, you'll be matched with scholarships that fit your criteria.
2. Your school counselor's office. Visit regularly to check on local and national awards.
3. The college you plan to attend. Contact the school for a list of scholarships they provide and the application procedures.
4. National search sites such as College Board, Peterson's, and Chegg.
5. Other resources could include your coach, clubs and organizations, and your parents' employers and civic organizations.

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# Education at Its Best

Often people think a small school means small opportunities. Not at APS. At Arnold, small means that students will get both individualized attention and the flexibility to push their learning to the next level. Beyond the extensive regular classes that APS offers is the impressive opportunity to take online and dual-credit college courses.

Staff members at Arnold, especially guidance counselor Ms. Nansel, do an incredible job showing students the opportunities to take these college courses. If students show an interest in an area, Nansel or others will spend time finding what classes work best for each student.

Dual-credit courses allow students to take college courses as high school students. Dual-credit means that the class counts for both college credit and high school credit. Taking the courses in high school can help students get a head start for college and save money on college costs.

Jace Connell, a senior at APS, has seen this benefit first hand, "Not only do college courses give me credits that will directly help me get ahead in college, they prepare me to deal with the step up into college and give me a hint of what college will be like."

After choosing classes, the students are then guided through registering and preparing for the course. As long as the chosen class is dual-credit, the school will provide any books or materials students

may need.

Typical courses students have taken include: Intro to Sociology, Intro to Psychology, American or World History, Human Relations, Expository Writing I and II, Applied Statistics, and College Algebra. While taking the class, APS provides students with a classroom and class period to take the course.

Arnold students have a real advantage when they sign up for Expository Writing I and II. These are dual credit classes taught by Arnold High's own high school English teacher, Mrs. Moninger. Having a college class offered in the school by an APS teacher gives students the benefit of learning in person.

A majority of the classes taken are online. Students are typically given reading assignments and educational videos to watch. Assignments include posting responses to material covered, writing papers, and taking quizzes and exams. Others, such as College Algebra and Statistics, are completed over the Distance-Learning system. Classes may meet two or three times a week with the professor, and the other days are used as workdays.

Kenna Rogers, a student at APS who has taken several dual-credit courses, has seen many advantages through her opportunities, "Taking dual credit classes has helped me get a feel for

how college classes will work. Plus I will go into my freshmen year with credits under my belt. My favorite class so far is probably English. However, I am excited to take an Intro to Psychology class because that will be my major."

The benefits of taking college courses in high school are evident. Students are able to expand their knowledge, get a head start for college, and save on total college costs. Some college classes may also help students decide on a future area of study. By providing opportunities like this, Arnold Public Schools is helping students prepare for the next big step in their lives, college.

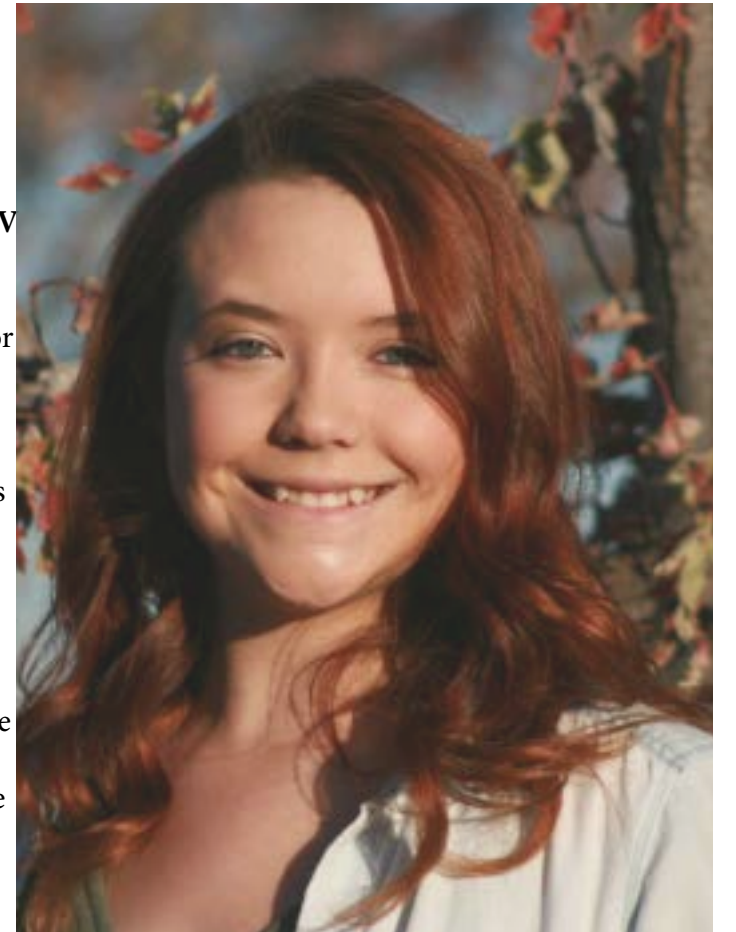

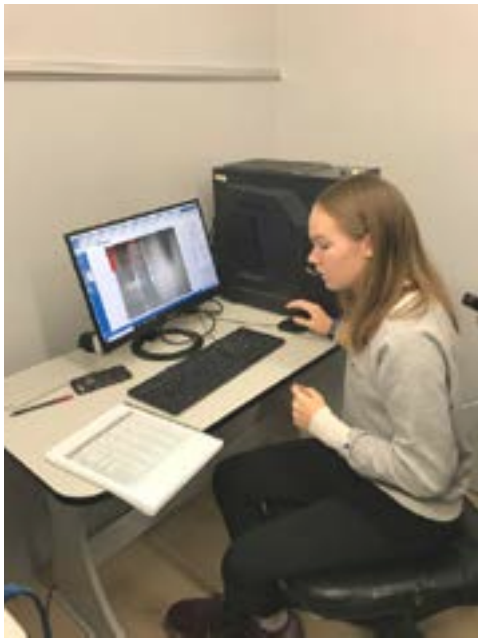

## From the Superintendent: Times Fun When You’re Having Flies

Remembering the Past; Embracing the Future

When I was in high school, I saved my money for one of my first major purchases - a stereo. Although it was a relatively inexpensive (that sounds better than cheap) stereo, the sound quality was vastly superior to my previous transistor radio. Not only could this stereo receive FM stations (yes, that was in big deal in the 1970s!), it even had a record player! I could now listen to my favorite records in stereophonic sound! What memories, what



memories . . .

Although records are making somewhat of a comeback, they are generally considered obsolete. Most of the records I played on

that first stereo have long since disappeared through garage sales, auctions, or thrift stores.
