BEWARE OF CUTWORM

Dingy, dark sided and sans cutworms are pests the farmers should watch for after the corn emerges. Early detection will enable treatments before devastating damage is done. Cutworms attack any field but prime are fields that had a wet problem last year, newly till sod fields (alfalfa or native grass) and fields that still contain large amounts of crop residue.

To detect cutworms early, walk your fields and determine percentage of cut corn plants and plan with chunks eaten from the leaf margins. Be certain the cutworms are causing the damage. Cutworms are fat bodied worms that are usually in C-shape and within 2-3 inches of the plant just under the soil surface.

Make counts at five different points in the field, and examine 20 plants each time for a total of 100 plants. Treatment may be justified if more than 5% of the plants show injury and the cutworms are less than one inch long.

If treatment is required, use Lorsban 4E broadcast at a rate of 1-1 1/4 lb. active ingredient/acre and follow immediately with a rotary hoe. The University of Missouri rates Pydrin 2,4 EC as equal to Lorsban in effectiveness. Pydrin has just been registered for cutworm control in corn.

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FARM AND HOME NEWS

TIME TO CONTROL MUSK THISTLE

Herbicides are the most efficient tools of controlling musk and plumless thistles in Custer County pastures. The time to spray thistles is in the rosette stage during the month of May. The smaller the rosette, the more effective the control. Effective herbicide treatments include 1 1/4 to 2 quarts of 4 lb. per gallon 2,4-D or 1 quart 2,4-D plus 1/2 pint banvel or 6 to 8 ounces tordon - 22K per acre.

All the above suggested herbicides are injurious to trees, shrubs, windbreaks, gardens, ornamentals, alfalfa, and broad-leaf crops.

Application should be made when there is little or no wind movement. Any air movement at the time of application should be away from sensitive plants. Tordon is a restricted use herbicide and should be applied by certified applicators. Treatment of thistles do little if any good once the plant has formed a bud or flower. For best results one should spray musk thistles as soon as possible. In a few short weeks the thistles will be flowering and going to seed.

4-H CAMP DATES SET FOR JUNE 28 - 30

Custer County 4-H camp dates have been scheduled for June 28, 29, and 30th at the Nebraska State 4-H Camp at Halsey, according to Colleen Peterson, 4-H Aide from the Custer County Extension Service.

Any Custer County 4-H'ers, age 8-13, are eligible for this camp. Cost of the camp is \$25.00. The camp is limited to 100 Custer County 4-H'ers on a "first come first serve basis."

Applications for 4-H camp have been sent out to Custer County 4-H'ers and are due in the Extension Office by Friday, June 18. Anyone in need of an application should contact the office.

Many activities that will be taking place at camp include pool swimming, crafts, outdoor education, sports, canoeing, campfires, project adventure, and nature study.

Camp counselors this year will include: Sally Vohland, Broken Bow; Margaret Devine, Oconto; and Sally Hircok, Ansley.

4-H DISTRICT AND STATE HORSE SHOWS SCHEDULED

Dates & locations have been set for the 1982 Nebraska District and State 4-H Horse Shows. All Custer County 4-H'ers 12 years of age and older by January 1, 1982 are eligible, according to Bill Pedersen, county agent.

All entries for the District Show and the State Exposition must be in the county extension office by

Tuesday, June 1. Level II and Level III forms must also accompany the entry forms. Level III riders may enter roping, dressage and advanced pleasure, and horsemanship classes.

The District Horse Show is scheduled for Wednesday, June 30 at Stapleton. The State 4-H Horse Show and Exposition is July 12-15 at Fonner Park in Grand Island.

4-H members can obtain entry forms from their 4-H horse leader or at the Custer County Extension office.

CUSTER COUNTY 4-H DAIRY JUDGING TO BE JUNE 10TH

The 1982 area 4-H Dairy Judging contest will be held at the Bob Racicky family Elk Creek Dairy south of Ansley Thursday, June 10th.

4-H members, parents, and leaders are invited to participate according to Don Lydic, Custer County Extension Agent. Registration will begin at 1:00 p.m. with judging beginning at 1:30. The Racicky farm is located 9 miles south of the Highway 2 and 183 junction at Ansley, then 1 1/4 miles east and 1/4 mile south.

Four classes of dairy animals will be judged, including junior calves, 2 year old cows, 3 year old cows, and 4 year old cows. Reasons will be given on one class with questions being asked on the remaining classes.

Medals will be provided by Elk Creek Dairy and given in both the junior and senior divisions to the top three individuals. All participants will receive ribbon placings.

NOW HEAR THIS

May and June is prime tornado season because that is when the majority of the tornadoes will occur. We encourage everyone to specifically review your preparations for the tornado season - do you have the following numbers posted in a prominent place: Reg. 26 Communicat'n 942-3435 Arnold's Fire Number 848-2222

Do you have a flashlight that works? Do you have a portable radio? Does your family know where to go for shelter?

Dandelions are here! Scattered plants can be effectively controlled by digging with a knife or special dandelion digger. Cut the root off 4 to 5 inches below the ground. Deep cutting is necessary to prevent regrowth from the root. Killer Kanes that dispense a squirt of herbicide onto the center of individual weeds also work well for treating scattered plants.

Heavy infestations of dandelions, shepherds'pursue, mustards, chickweed, and hembit are best controlled with 2,4-D and combinations of 2,4-D and MCPP (mecoprop). Both granular and liquid formulations are available. Granular forms are often combined with fertilizer for a once

over weed and feed treatment.

When using liquids, keep sprayer pressure as low as possible to avoid fine droplets that are more likely to drift to non target plants. Nozzle applicators that fit on gallon jugs reduce drift hazards, are inexpensive and easy to use. Fall applications are the best.

The effectiveness of a gardener's weed control efforts distinguishes an ordinary gardener from a good gardener - cultivation, black plastic, or mulch are suggested for average home gardens. Larger gardens may demand the use of chemicals. For information pick up a copy of the NebGuide "Weed Control in Gardens" 79-444.

Tornado Detection Instructions

Two quick steps to follow when a tornado warning has been broadcast for your area.

1st Warm up your TV set and tune in channel 13. Darken the screen to almost black by using the brightness control.

2nd Turn to channel 2 and leave the volume control down (unless you have a broadcaster on that channel).

Your tornado detector is now in operation. As a storm approaches, lightning will produce momentary white bands of varying widths across the screen (color sets produce a colored band). A tornado within 15 or 20 miles will produce a totally white screen and remain white (color on color sets). Should this occur, turn off your TV set, take your portable radio and go to a place of shelter immediately.

This system was discovered by Newton Weller of West Des Moines, Iowa, after twelve years of study. It works because every TV set has channel 2 set at 55 megacycles. Lightning and tornadoes generate a signal near this frequency which overrides the brightness control. Channel 13 is the "high" end of the frequency band and is not affected. This is why the darkness must be set on that channel.

Keep a portable radio handy for emergency instructions and in case of power failure. Lightning will cause intermittent static on a radio tuned to 550 kilocycles. A tornado will cause steady, continuous static.

Rules Made At Women's Softball Meeting

On Friday, May 21st, eleven women and two coaches met to represent the four teams of the Women's Softball League. The following issues were discussed, voted on, and passed with majority ruling.

1. The teams will remain the same as last year. It was voted on last year to keep the same teams for three years so 1982 is the second year for these teams.
2. If the husband is a coach or sponsor of a team, the wife has the option to play on his team.
3. Time-limit: the first game must start at 7:00. If started later than 7:15, the game will be called after a complete inning closest to 8:30 with the winner being the team with the most points. The same rule applies to the 8:30 game. If started later than 8:45 or 15 minutes after the end of the first game, it will be called at 10:00 or approximately 1 1/2 hours after the start of the game.
4. The "10 run rule" will apply after 5 innings.
5. "Stealing home" is not allowed on a wild pitch or dropped ball.
6. Both teams playing will be allowed a "Rover" as long as each team has enough players.
7. Substitutes can be any female as long as they are not a player on any other team.
8. Each team will elect a representative to be in charge of dues, money for umpire, helping the coach call players, represent the team with the coach at various meetings, etc.
9. There is a \$5.00 fee per player for the season which goes toward maintenance of the ball diamond, and another \$5.00 fee per player to be paid to the Home Plate Umpire. This money will insure a regular umpire to call the games and decide the time limit.
10. Playing "Slow Pitch" was discussed and will be voted on when all the teams are together for the first game.
