They started out not knowing how to read their lines and now they not only know their lines, but also have them memorized.” said Mrs. Ryan, the first grade teacher.


The shoppers were played by: Peyton Recoy, Kirby Viter, and Quinlee Weinman.





Hello Arnold Patrons,

The 2nd quarter has started to fly by and we are now getting into Dec and then Jan. In these winter months I want to remind parents to dress students appropriately. Students go outside for recess unless the temperature is below 10 degrees. Making sure students have winter coats, gloves, and hats is beneficial. When there is snow on the ground students need snow boots and snow pants to play on the snow piles.

Over the next month APS will also be conducting our winter assessments. All students K-11 will take the NWEA Winter Map Assessment. There are a few

things students can start or continue to do to perform their best on these assessments. Attendance is important for students to be involved in daily information and review sessions. Also, eating right by getting a good breakfast, and a good night's sleep will help students. It is also important to develop these habits and routines weeks leading up to the assessment. The kindergarten through 5th grade students will take the winter assessment exams at their own class pace and schedule. The 6th through 11th grades are scheduled to take the winter assessments on Dec 14th and 15th.

I wanted to touch base with everyone on the Math Instructional materials for grades K-12 that Arnold Public Schools is implementing this year. This was an opportunity to upgrade materials to meet the expectations of Nebraska College and Career Ready Standards for Mathematics. As with updating or implementing anything new, there will be a learning process before one can fully understand all components.

The Envison Mathematics from Savvas is a very rigorous program that is aligned with the Nebraska College and Career Ready Standards. Teachers have had the opportunity for one professional development from Savvas at the beginning of school, and will have another one at the end of this semester. They also had the opportunity to talk to another school's

staff that is in their second year of using Envision from Savvas.

Being able to have those conversations with other teachers was beneficial. This is a new program that brings a new perspective and concepts to our math instruction. Because it is a new thinking process, with the new material alignment, and concepts being taught sooner than before, it will be a developmental process.

This will be the same math being taught as before, but the timeline of when students learn certain skills has changed and a different process of understanding has been added. This is a result of aligning with the Nebraska College and Career Ready Standards for Mathematics. Teachers and anyone that has helped with the math lessons can probably share your frustration or confusion that you may encounter when helping your child.

However, teachers are really starting to see the benefits of the new materials and the developmental process as they continue with lessons. I just wanted to take this time to let everyone know of the transition with the Math Instructional Materials. If you are experiencing difficulty helping your child, hang in there and keep an open mind to the new materials. Teachers really are seeing benefits in the classroom.
