On Tuesday, March 1st, a Forensics Day was held in which students in the class were able to take a whole day to spend in the science room doing forensic labs and activities. The main lab the students spent doing involved

different specimens, separating the DNA out of the specimens using a centrifuge, and then running the DNA through a Gel Electrophoresis machine. This machine is a high-tech piece of laboratory equipment used by forensic scientists worldwide in order to solve crimes.

What this machine does is it allows you to compare DNA samples and see which ones match up with each other. Doing these labs

allows students to develop specialized skills that many students don't get the opportunity to develop; such as micropipetting, separating and multiplying DNA, and many more skills.

A special thanks goes out to the SORC Board and Ron & Nancy Cool for supplying the APS science programs with the funds to purchase all of the new equipment for the forensics class.

Halsey; The Arnold High School quiz bowl team started their season off at the Halsey National Forest Observatory where this year's MNAC quiz bowl competition was held. Teams who attended included Arnold, Callaway, Thedford, Sandhills, Arthur County, Cody-Kilgore, Hyannis, Stapleton, Anselmo-Merna, Sargent, and Loup

County. These teams were split into an "A" pool and "B" pool to start off the day and teams within the pools competed against every other team in their respective pools. The teams with the top two points scored from each pool then got to move on to the four-team, "championship bracket", with team record deciding any ties.

Arnold had a great round-robin of pool play, winning

five of their six pool-play matches and scoring over 100 team points throughout the matches. This was enough to qualify Arnold for the championship bracket, putting them against Arthur County which was the only team to beat Arnold in pool play. Arnold's team overcame the pool play loss

and beat Arthur County to move onto the conference championship match against Thedford. Unfortunately, Thedford was a bit faster on the buzzers and was able to beat Arnold to take the conference title. Even after the tough final round loss, Arnold's team was happy to bring home some hardware.

- *Park in areas with lots of light*
- *Lock car doors from the inside, do not use remote to lock*
- *Avoid gas stops after dark*
- *Communicate travel plans with family or a friend*
- *Assess your environment*

During the show he brought some of the students out of the crowd to volunteer to help him with some of the animals that he could not direct or control by himself.


When he chose students out





Arnold Community Cleanup


